# March - Unfinished Magic

During the business part of the meeting we discussed offering to perform a show for the Richman's Night out against Crime event. This event will be at the park next to the Library that the club now meets at. It would be a good way to pay back for the space.

Tom Paine gave a mini lecture lighting and sound for magicians in any venue. He discussed simple and effective ways to maximize your performance. Some suggestions he had was; if possible turn down the furnace, and turn down any radios, turn off the TV if you are performing in a house. Use a microphone even if you think you do not need it. When you get to the venue and there is not a stage look for the sweet spot for your performance, don't let the client place you in a spot that puts your performance at a disadvantage. Adjust the lighting to best spotlight you and your area. When you come to a venue think about the lighting and sound and before your show see what you can do to best light your show and the best way for the sound. He then took questions from the group about lighting and sound in different venues.

Ralph Huntzinger showed a routine he was working on using fuzzy 2 tone balls, starting with one and ending with eight, he was still working on a script and some of the handling of the balls and an ending for the routine. There was a discussion from the club with some suggestions.

Devin Graupmann showed a coin box routine he was working on.

The club then broke up into groups with people showing routines they were working on or trying to learn and getting help. It became form the rest of the evening a large jam session.

Everyone had a good time.

We then had the drawing for some prizes.

### How did you get interested in magic, and what year did you start your new interest?

I started magic when I was 10 years old in Japan. I really liked entertaining my classmates in school -- I was the class clown - but I wasn't that good at it and wanted to find more material. I was kind of a nerdy, geeky kid. When I saw magic I thought that it would be perfect and give me brilliant material to entertain. I started out with a simple sponge ball routine I bought at a local magic shop and then a square box dice mind reading trick. Everybody loved it and when I performed it made me feel popular. People came to watch me when I performed but when I was done they wanted more, so it forced me to work on my stage personality part and talking. 20 years later I'm still working on new material trying to make people happy.

# Who are your heroes? (Other magicians, or persons in your life who inspired you, or affected your development as a performer and a human being)

In magic, the first magician that inspired me was Johnny Lone from Sweden. I loved his work, his skill, his character and comedy and warmness. I first saw him on television when I was 10 and when I was a teenager, then I got to meet him at a magic convention. When I was 26, I was a guest performer and featured on the same stage as him at a magic convention. We have very different acts, he's more of a comedian and I'm more of a technical stage magician so it was very different. I got to meet him many times after that.

Another person who inspired me is Jackie Chan. When I was growing up I really loved his movies and his style and would watch him constantly. He influenced my stage persona a lot and who I wanted to be. A lot of people can see similar humor and personality style when I perform and that is the reason why.

#### What is your greatest, professional achievement?

I have more than 30 1st place awards in magic which I've worked hard to achieve, but the most valuable thing is I have are the really close wonderful friends I've met who I really respect and can count on. To me that is the most important thing in my life and I would never have accomplished where I am if I didn't have them in my life.

#### What decision in your life (wrong or right) did you learn the most from?

When I moved to the states I knew very few people and very little English. So I worked hard to learn the language better and network with as many other magicians as I could. After that experience I learned I can survive in any country and any situation and make new friends through magic, which is a universal language in itself.

#### Tell us about a funny situation / situations that happened while you were performing?

I was performing at the Magic Castle for the very first time. When I started to perform, I came out behind the curtains in the Parlor room and I saw so many famous magicians in the audience it made me a little nervous. I started to perform my Ninja Rings routine and the first technique was the spinning link effect, but they didn't link! I tried again and they still didn't link! Again I tried to link them, same thing, except then the single ring dropped from the table to the floor. I tried to pick the ring up from the floor, and 2 jumbo coins from my vest pocket fell out to the floor. I picked up the jumbo coin and the rings, looked up at the audience, and started laughing uncontrollably because it was just too funny. The audience all laughed together with me, gave me a big cheer and I tried again. This time it linked and the audience gave me a standing ovation.

#### If you had chosen a different profession what would that be?

I would probably be a doctor because I am continuously polishing my skills and really care about people.

#### What is the best thing another person said to you?

Johnny Depp: "Wow" and then he was speechless.

#### Do you have a motto or a way of life, and what is (real) magic to you?

I always believe I can make things better than before. Also, related to that I never think that anything I do is ever complete or can't be improved upon.

#### Do you have some good advice for people who want to turn their passion into their profession?

Try to keep focused on the emotional aspect of your passion, the part that drives you to do what you want to do. For me, for example, it's making other people happy so I focus on that magic part when people are surprised and want to see more. Also, remember to help others and not be afraid to ask for help from people better than you. Real magic is the opportunity in meeting all the incredible people in your life.

#### **Powerful Rope Magic**

In "Powerful Rope Magic" Singapore magician Jeremy Pei teaches us several very powerful magic routines utilizing rope. It's just too bad that none of them are his.

First on the docket is something he calls "Hyper Knot". A trick the rest of the world knows either as Pavel's "Fantastic Knot" or Daryl's "Jumping Knot of Pakistan". Mr. Pei credits neither of these magicians while teaching us his version of their trick. Oddly enough he does manage to credit Pavel for a slip knot he learned from him off a DVD at one point. But he fails to credit him for the very trick he's teaching you to use it in. Odd.

Next up is "Hanging Knots". A rope trick which Mr. Pei says was inspired by David Roth's "Hanging Coins". Here a knot is tied into a length of rope. This knot is then, in a single motion, plucked from the center rope, made invisible and then hung in space directly in front of the magician. This is repeated twice more until three invisible knots are supposedly floating mysteriously in midair above the magicians head. The magician then, using the old "Firemans Knot" move from "Ashley's Book of Knots", causes the three knots to visibly reappear back on the rope.

We are then treated to two different handlings of the now classic "Professor's Nightmare". Each routine ends with the three ropes melding into a single length of cord -- Again, nothing new or different here. And while he credits, sometimes erroneously, various folk for some of the moves he demonstrates Bob Carver, the creator of the effect is never mentioned.

We are now treated to something Mr. Pei calls the "Impossible Walking Knot". A feat that is only impossible if you fail to own even the most rudimentary of books on rope magic.

There's also a cut and restored rope routine pretty much right out of Tarbell (magnets instead of rope gimmicks). Finally the trick portion of the DVD finishes with the Linking Ropes (with no credit for the creator EJ Moore given) and a neck and body penetration using the ancient Grandmothers necklace principle.

On the plus side there is one nice subtlety featured in the Linking ropes segment and good reasoning behind the number and placement of the magnets for the "Professors Nightmare" routine. But with his lack of appropriately accrediting his source material it is hard to say if it any of these are his original idea or not.

The DVD finishes with instructions on how to gimmick the ropes and finish off the ends. The end finishing segment is far from complete. Showing only two ways to finish off the ends, one of them being simply wrapping it with tape. His instructions on how to secure the magnets into the cord too is woefully lacking in depth, showing us just one way to accomplish the task.

I could only recommend this DVD for the complete novice. A novice that has no moral or ethical problems owning a DVD tipping other peoples material.

Anyone with even a modicum of knowledge about the fine art of rope magic will find little here of interest.

Notes to Self By Phil Reda

It has been awhile since I have written an article for the newsletter. Work and other commitments have been keeping me occupied. This months article is going to be short but I think you will find it of great interest.

A couple of months ago I was reading a set of lecture notes from Jay Sankey. Buried towards the back was a vey interesting effect utilizing a FISIM flash. For those of you who do not know what a FISIM flash is it a small electronic device that will produce a flash of light at your command. This was invented and made famous by the very inventive John Cornelius.

There are many uses for this device but the mostly widely used purpose is for punctuating the magical moment. For example during a coin vanish- just as the hand is opening there is a strange flash of light (the magic moment). In the Sankey routine it is utilized in a psychic effect which I am very interested in these days.

Well I wanted to try and find a FISIM flash for the Sankey routine and they are very hard to find. So I did a little digging around and found a YouTube clip on how to make very inexpensive flash unit. Here is the link - I hope you enjoy!
