- Read. And Read Everything There are huge amounts of information only found in the literature. It forces you to use your imagination and bring your personality to the magic.
- String Tricks Together Think in terms of a show, not individual tricks. This could just be three tricks in 10 minutes.
- 4) Be Original Find the unique thing about yourself. Both Mac King and Payne perform many standard tricks, but both are unique.
- 5) Failure is Your Friend Mistakes are how we learn.
- Do Magic Find ways to perform a lot for audiences. (Charity shows, retirement homes, city events)

A Knight's Tour With Free Choice of Start and End

A Knight's Tour is an ancient mathematical problem in which a chessman knight is moved, according to the rules of chess, around an empty chess board so that it lands on each of the sixty-four squares only once. For centuries it has been a popular conundrum among mathematicians and chess addicts alike and has, in recent times, appeared sporadically as a mental feat in the acts of magicians and mind readers.

There are two types of tours. Open and closed. A closed tour is one in which the knights final resting place is in a position where it could capture its starting square. An open tour is one where this is not the case. Mr. Wasshuber has developed a method which allows the performer not only to present both types of tours but also to successfully create one in which the spectator has freely chosen both the starting and ending squares, as long as they are of opposing colors -- ending on the same color square as one starts is as mathematically impossible as trisecting an angle or rounding a square.

It is a slim E-Book comprising just 17 pages but it is clearly and concisely written with all the necessary diagrams one would need to learn this version of a knight's tour. There are no presentation ideas nor tips put forth in the manuscript leaving it entirely to the reader to develop for themselves an act where a knight is moved about a chessboard in an entertaining and engaging way. Be warned, this is not a magic trick. It's not even a trick. It's a true and unadulterated feat. Mr. Wasshuber has developed a matrix that allows the performer to work out in their head a unique Knight's Tour where the spectator chooses the start and stopping square. Thus this is not something you can pick up on Friday afternoon with the expectation that you can put it in your show on Saturday night. Unless of course the Saturday night you are thinking of is several months from now.

For most of us mere mortals this display of mental agility is going to require a huge amount of memorization and practice. One needs to be able to visualize and hold in their mind the image of a quartered and seemingly random numbered chessboard as well as the path that the knight needs to make on it this time around. No mean feat as it is journey is different every time you do it. So if you suffer from numerophobia or your little grey cells aren't as nimble as they used to be you may find all this to be a daunting, if not completely insurmountable task. However if you're the kind of person who can work out the permutations of a memorized deck after it's been faro shuffled eight times this manuscript might be just be right up your alley.

This month we have a guest writer for the newsletter. Phil Reda was at the July meeting and gave a workshop on the Brainwave deck and demonstration of a deck switch. Below are his thoughts on the deck switch. Thank Phil.

In Search for the Perfect Deck Switch By Phil Reda

After the Brain Wave Deck teach-in I was asked by several club members about the deck switch I used and deck switches in general. I thought it might be helpful to put some thoughts on paper and possibly open a discussion on the topic.

Card magic was my main focus for years and now, after taking a hiatus from magic for several years my new found passion is mentalism. Over the years I have played around with different types of deck switches – from simply putting the deck in my pocket and pulling out another deck to elaborate deck shells or body loads. Is there a Holy Grail of deck switches? The answer is yes! But it probably is not the answer you want to hear. The perfect deck switch is the one that is right for your performance piece. The key is to look at the routine that you are going to perform and analyze what actions are occurring before and after the point where the switch will occur. Look for some sort of motivation and that is where the method for the

switch lies. It is the actual performance that gives the cover for the switch. It is almost a Zen thing. Simple is better and go with the flow – don't try to swim against the current.

Let's look at the Brain Wave deck demo. I started with a real deck. A spectator was sitting to my right and I gave her a pad of paper to write on. I was holding the real deck in my left hand. In front of me was my trusty magic bag that I take the things I need out of (it is actually an old Doctor's bag). As I was telling her what I wanted her to do I placed my left hand with the deck into the bag to get a pen – I did not say anything about getting a pen – I just did it. My attention was on the spectator and explaining to her what I wanted her to do. As my hand entered the bag I released the deck and let it fall to the bottom (there was a folded towel on the bottom to absorb any noise). This action allows my hand to be free as I reach the Brain Wave deck and there is no hesitation – one continuous motion. Let me step back for a moment the Brain Wave deck was placed off to the side in the bottom of my bag with the pen resting on top – that way I could grab both at the same time. As my hand came out I handed the pen to the spectator.

As you can see in the above my motivation was needing a pen and again I did not mention that in my script. Personally I think it raises suspicion if you mention that you need a pen. Second I blocked my performance piece so I had my bag and spectator in the proper position. Finally and I think this is important, when I am reaching into the bag I am thinking to myself I am only going to get a pen – this is the silent scripting that is talked about in Henning Nelms seminal work and a must read – Magic and Showmanship. By running the silent script it keeps me from looking guilty – I am just going for pen – no need to call attention to it.

If you are contemplating a deck switch keep it simple and analyze your routine. It could be as simple as putting the deck in your pocket doing something else and pulling out your new deck for your next miracle. As a final note there was an article published in Genii by Roberto Giobbi on constructing a deck switch – it might be worth looking up.

Those of you who were at the meeting I hope you enjoyed the presentation and thank you for your hospitality
